- Alberta's job vacancy rate in December 2014 was the highest in Canada at 2.1%, followed by Saskatchewan's 2.0%.
- In December 2014, Alberta's job vacancy rate¹ was down 0.1 percentage points from November 2014 and up by 0.2 percentage points from December 2013.

Alberta accounted for 18.9% of all job vacancies in Canada in December 2014, down from 20.4% in November 2014.

Alberta's unemployment-to-job-vacancies ratio in December 2014 was down 0.3 percentage points from the previous month at 2.3 unemployed individuals per job vacancy. This was up 0.1 percentage points from December 2013 and was notably below the Canadian average ratio of 5.0 in December 2014.

Alberta's job vacancy rate was highest² in the Accommodation and Food Services in December 2014 at 5.1%.

- In December 2014, the total number of job vacancies³ in Alberta was 43,900. This was the third highest in Canada after Ontario's 80,200 and Quebec's 46,000.
- This was 1,400 less than the 45,300 vacancies for the same month last year.
